Eighth Day History: Jeff began Eighth Day Farm in 2010 as a for profit CSA, however, his passions went beyond merely selling produce and into holistic community development. During the growing season, Josh Hauch approached Jeff with the idea of becoming a nonprofit and bringing the farm into the city of Holland. Throughout 2010 and into early 2011, Jeff and Josh researched, held meetings and eventually, through the help of several friends and 3sixty (a local neighborhood non-profit), was graciously given the land at 709 Pine Ave. by Zion Lutheran Church to farm. For 2011, Eighth Day Farm came under 3sixty for their use of the non-profit covering



during this first year, Eighth Day has been blessed to begin two new partnerships.

an Raalte Tech Public High School. Van Raatle Tech is an alternative high school located in the west core neighborhood of Holland. This school assists students in either receiving their GED or returning to a traditional high school. A year ago, Josh Hauch began building a relationship with VR Tech students and staff through weekly interactions at the school.

This year we have a more formal relationship with the school and are working with set up weekly a farm to table science program. The school has granted the use of their courtyard space to raise a few chickens, as well as plant raised bed gardens. This will give students a chance to learn about food systems and build responsibility through hands on experiences.

Another benefit of this new partnership is students will have the opportunity to learn basic grant writing and budget planning skills as they work together to submit a student oriented grant to a local foundation. This is part of the project will soon begin. We are excited to watch our partnership bloom (pun intended)!



olland Town Center. In the spring of 2011, the Holland Sentinel ran an article about Eighth Day Farm. From this article, we were approached by Mike Bocks, the developer of The Holland Town Center (formerly, the Holland Outlet Mall) and began a new partnership.

Eighth Day Farm will open the 2012 season with a new site on the north side of Holland. We are excited about this for several reasons; first, our use of the land will encourage green space within the expansive amount of pavement in the parking lot. Secondly, our location is right across the street from the Department of Human Services and the Ottawa County Health Department. In the future, we're hoping to begin working with low income families to help provide fresh, local produce in an easily accessible location. This is just a hope, currently, as no formal decisions or connections with the organizations have been made.

We've been quite busy in our first vear as a nonprofit. We're proud of all that we've accomplished. Here is a quick snapshot of the reach of our work.

planting seeds

Urban farms come in many shapes and sizes and a big part of the fun here at Eighth Day Farm is experiencing the process of self-discovery. This first year under a nonprofit we were able to dabble in a variety of services to the communityfield trips for elementary age children, mentoring teens, employing neighbors from the core city, donating food and flowers. As we gaze forward into 2012 we're contemplating which of the services we can offer is most needed. We don't pretend to have reached some dogmatic answer to this question. Our discerning is keenly contextual, and by this we mean to say we want to be good observers and responders to what is going on in Holland and to the needs that are unique or particular to this community.

It has been our observation that Holland has a strong, often faith based force when it comes to food distribution. We believe food give-aways are essential to attend to immediate hunger needs, and so we want to have a foot in this field as well, especially because fresh produce is most often what is lacking in food distribution. However, a holistic ministry cannot stop with bandaging the symptoms of societal problems, but must go further to identify and work on healing the root causes. Like many cities, Holland suffers from high unemployment, and here too we want to help. Our size and the seasonal nature of our work currently dictate the degree to which we can offer employment. That being said, we are of the persuasion that helping to shape a future where America is dotted with many small, sustainable farms is an incredibly concrete way to lower unemployment rates. Sustainable agriculture is simply more human labor intensive and what could be a better strategy to put a nation back to work than honest physical labor

that feeds neighbors with healthy food? Which leads us to this conclusion: the place we feel most equipped to ignite change is in educating our youth.

As Eighth Day Farm makes plans for 2012 at the forefront is going to be a Youth Internship Program that em-

ploys local teenagers while equipping them with essential job skills and an opportunity to learn where their food comes from and how to use food to nurture their own community. It will be work that challenges them spiritually, physically, mentally,

and socially. They will experience positive adult interaction and be able to reinforce their own learning by planning and hosting a farm summer camp for elementary age youth. Again, our

intent is to plant seeds in young minds that will someday bear the fruit of a healthier and more just food system for us
